Marharmchurch Field

Our touring field is named after the small inland village of Marharmchurch which is named after a Celtic saint who founded a hermitage in the area. The pretty village houses traditional cob cottages complete with thatched roofs. Every year on the first Monday after the 12th of August you can witness the celebration of the saint at the Marharmchurch Revel which includes a procession led by the Queen of the Revel on horseback, Cornish dancing and wrestling.

What to do at Marharmchurch

Relax in the Bullers Arms a traditional, family freehouse named after an old Cornish Family.

Explore the Planekeepers' Path a 10 mile walk starting from the square.

Experience the delicious, award winning cheese produced by Whalesborough Farm Foods.

Marharmchurch is 2 miles from Widemouth Fields

Morwenstow Meadow

Our glamping and camping meadow is named after the most northerly parish in Cornwall: Morwenstow. On the cliff path at Morwenstow you can visit Hawker's Hut which was built in the 1800s out of Driftwood by the enigmatic Parson Hawker who is reported to have enjoyed smoking Opium and watched over the ships from his hut, performing burials for drowned sailors.

What to do at Marharmchurch

Relax with a "Cakey Tea" at the Rectory Tearooms.

Explore the pretty church dedicated to St. Morwenna and St. John the Baptist

Experience the mystique of Parson Hawker's Hut

Morwenstow is 11 miles from Widemouth Fields

The Poundstock Bar

Poundstock is a nearby village with a violent and dramatic history. There has been a church here for fourteen centuries and the cattle pound which gives the village its name is nearly as old. The church is said to be visited by the ghost of William Penfound who was killed at the altar and his blood smeared all around the church. 300 years later another member of the Penfound family was killed in a love story to match Romeo and Juliet and is also said to haunt the area. Also found in the village is the Poundstock Guildhouse, a Tudor church and the only one of its type in the county.

What to do at Poundstock

Relax with a film from the nearby, traditional Rebel Cinema.

Explore the 15th Century Guildhouse with its feasting hall.

Experience the Poundstock Revel in spring which has been celebrated for centuries.

Poundstock is 1.6 miles from Widemouth Fields

Box's Shop

Widemouth Fields is actually situated in the hamlet of Box's Shop which is named after a Mr. Box, the local blacksmith who lived in the cottage on the corner of the crossroads. Many old forges in Cornwall were called shops and named after the resident Blacksmith. Blacksmiths were prominent figures in Cornish history from leading rebellions in the 15th century to helping build Trevithick's first steam locomotive, the Cornish Blacksmith was a revered and skilful member of the community. We can't promise that we can shoe a horse but we thought it was time that Box's Shop actually got back its shop!
